4	CHARLES SKILES, being duly sworn by the clerk,
5	testified as follows:
6	DIRECT EXAMINATION by Mr. Rupp:
7	Q. Sir, could you state your name for the record,
8	please.
9	A. Charles Thomas Skiles.
10	Q. And, Mr. Skiles, what is your address?
11	A. Box 466, Mineral Point, Missouri, Route 1.
12	Q. And is that somewhere close to Hopewell Road?
13	A. Yes, right on Hopewell Road.
14	Q. And would your driveway actually face Hopewell
15	Road?
16	A. Yeah.
17	Q. And approximately how long have you lived at that
18	address?
19	A. Since `79.
20	Q. And would it be a fair statement that you were
21	living there on December 5 <sup>th</sup> , of the year 1998?
22	A. Yes.
23	Q. I'd like to call your attention to that morning and
24	ask you if you recall approximately what time you got up
25	that morning?

Yes.

A.

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1 A. Back door. 2 Q. So you went straight out the back door? 3 A. Yes. 4 Q. And past your garage? 5 A. Yes. 6 Q. And over to here; is that correct? 7 Yes, on the right side of my garage. A. 8 0. On this side? 9 A. No, the other side. 10 0. Right side? 11 A. Uh-hum. 12 And would it be fair to say that there is a little Q. path there, not a big one but a foot path? 13 14 A. Yeah. 15 Q. And you went that direction? 16 A. Yes. 17 And, sir, can you tell us what you recall seeing 18 when you got there? 19 When I got about to the end of the garage, I seen 20 the two boys running down to Rita's house. 21 0. And what happened? What did you do? 22 I just went on down there to Rita's house to see 23 what was going on. 24 And what happened when you got to Rita's house? Q. 25 I went inside, and when I went inside, the boys was A.

Q. Did you then look in Rita's bedroom?

1 A. I filled the pan up probably two or three times. 2 0. And you just threw it in the room? Yes. A. 3 Q. And after the third time what, if anything, 4 5 happened? 6 That's when everybody started showing up, the fire 7 department. Q. While you were throwing water on Rita, do you know where the defendant was? 9 10 A. I had no idea. He wasn't with you? 11 0. 12 A. No, not that I noticed, no. 13 MR. RUPP: I don't think I have any further 14 questions, Your Honor. CROSS-EXAMINATION by Mr. Williams: 15 Q. Mr. Skiles, when you got to this residence, you 16 picked up that hose out of the living room? 17 A. Yes. 18 19 And you drug it outside; is that correct? When I went back in the second time I did. 20 A. Q. Right. 21 22 A. I just reached in, grabbed it out, and drug it 23 outside on the deck and filled the pan up. 24 Q. And this water hose, it was yellow? 25 A. Yes.

And it was already on? 1 Yes. 2 A. 3 Q. From the faucet, right? Yes, from the well house. A. From the well house? 5 Q. A. Yes. 6 And you had to turn it on at the end of the hose; 7 is that correct? 8 Yes. It had one of them little screw type. 9 Q. Okay. And you screwed it in a direction, and it 10 came on? 11 12 A. Yes. Q. And you never told Detective Curt Davis that it 13 wasn't on from the well house, right? 14 A. No. As a matter of fact, I made it plain that I 15 turned it on at the end of the hose. I told him a second 16 time I turned it on at the end of the hose. 17 Q. And you made a statement, right, a written 18 statement; is that correct? 19 A. Yeah. 20 Q. And Detective Davis wrote that statement out for 21 you, didn't he? 22 23 A. Yes. Q. And have you had an opportunity recently to review 24 25 your statement?

1 A. I've looked at it, yes. And there's nothing in there, anywhere in your 2 handwritten statement that says that the hose wasn't on from 3 the well house, is there? 4 A. No. 5 Now, you had an opportunity that morning after you 6 received that call from Leighann Skiles to observe Bernie 7 Politte, right? 8 9 A. Yes. 10 When you first went out of your house in an effort to go to Rita Politte's house, you saw Bernie, didn't you? 11 12 A. Yes. And you saw Josh Sansoucie? 0. 13 A. Yes. 14 And they were coming from the direction of Leighann 15 Skiles' house? 16 A. Yes. 17 And they were not walking, were they? Q. 18 19 Not when I see then, no. A. They were running, right? 20 Q. 21 A. Yes, they was. And at that point you had an opportunity to see 22 23 what Bernie had on, right? 24 A. Yes. He had on dark sweat pants? 25 Q.

1 A. Black sweat pants. 2 Q. Black sweat pants. No shirt? 3 A. No. 4 Q. No shoes? 5 A. No. Didn't it look like he just got out of bed? 6 Q. 7 MR. RUPP: Objection. Calls for speculation. 8 THE COURT: Sustained. 9 Q. (By Mr. Williams): But he didn't have any shirt on, 10 right? No. 11 A: 12 Q. Didn't have any shoes on? No. 13 A. 14 0. The only thing you saw was the black sweat pants? A. Yes. 15 Didn't have a hat on? 16 Q. 17 A. No. Now, you said that when you went out -- You got up 18 that morning about, what, 5:30? 19 20 No. I got up about 4:00. 21 0. About 4:00? 22 A. Yeah. And you made coffee when you got up? 23 Well, tossed and turned, and then I got up and made 24 coffee --25

Q. Okay. 1 -- like I usually do. 2 A. And at some point you went out on your front porch; 3 Q. is that correct? 4 5 A. Yes. Q. And you were standing out there. Was it still 6 7 dark? I was sitting down. 8 A. You were sitting down? 9 Q. 10 A. Yes. Was it still dark outside? 11 0. Yes. 12 A. Q. So when you were sitting down there drinking your 13 coffee in the dark, you weren't looking for nothing 14 suspicious, were you? 15 16 A. No. Q. And you didn't hear any dogs barking that you can 17 recall, right? 18 No, no more than normal. I mean, dogs bark all the 19 time out there. 20 That's correct. This is out in the country, right? 0. 21 22 A. Yes. It's not unusual to hear dogs barking, is it? 23 Q. 24 A. No. You hear them all the time, right? 25 Q.

1 A. Yes. 2 So would it be fair to say that you weren't really paying attention to whether dogs were barking or not? 3 4 No. I wasn't paying no attention to them. 5 Okay. If a dog would have been barking, do you think you might have not heard it or remembered it? 6 7 I guess it would be according to where it was barking from. 9 Q. Okay. Now, you say at some point you went into Rita Politte's residence, right? 10 11 A. Yes. 12 And you tried to extinguish the fire? 13 The second time I went in, yes. A. 14 The second time. You tried to pour water on it, Q. right? 15 16 A. Yes. 17 Q. At some point when you went in there though, the smoke was real thick, wasn't it? 18 19 No. It was kind of up high. 20 Q. Was it up high? 21 It wasn't down low. 22 Was that the second time that you went to the residence? 23 24 A. Yes. 25 Q. Wasn't the first time, right?

1 But the first time it was about the same thing. 2 Was it about the same thing? 3 A. Yes. 4 Q. I thought your testimony was a few minutes ago was that you couldn't see in there too well; is that correct? 5 6 A. No, I didn't say that. 7 Okay. Could you see in there very well? 0. 8 A. I seen her legs. 9 0. Okay. 10 A. That was it. 11 That's all you saw? Q. 12 That was it, because the smoke was kind of -- it 13 was kind of up high, about, probably two, three, four foot 14 off floor. 15 Two or three or four feet off the ground? A. 16 Yeah. 17 And the only thing you could see were her legs; is that right? 18 19 A. Yes. 20 Now, you've lived in this neighborhood for quite a few years, right? A. Yes. You said since the '70's. Q. A. In '79 I bought that house.

And you're familiar with the layout of this land,

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Q.

right? 1 2 A. Yeah. I'd like you to look at the State's exhibit here if 3 you would. Is it true that there are railroad tracks from 4 5 Rita Politte's house? 6 Yes. They're down at the bottom of the hill. 7 Can you point to where those tracks are? 0. 8 They'd be down past that road that's going into Rita's house. And you drop off a hill probably, roughly a quarter mile from the house I would imagine, something like that. Q. About a quarter mile? A. Approximately. Q. Could you step down and point to where those railroad tracks are? I think they're pretty obvious. Well, they're down past this shed here, whatever that is, going down to the railroad. Okay. Would this be the railroad tracks right here Q. that are labeled "railroad tracks" from Rita's house? A. It's them. The road goes on down. Q. And is there a path that leads from Rita Politte's house to the railroad tracks? There used to be one when I went to school down

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there.

If you're on those railroad tracks, can you get to

Old Hopewell Road from there if you walk the tracks? 1 2 A. Sure. That winds around with the Old Hopewell Road, 0. 3 4 right? 5 A. Yeah. So if somebody walked down that path behind Rita 6 7 Politte's house, it would be possible to get to eventually the Hopewell Road, right? 8 9 A. Yes. But you didn't see any traffic in front of the 10 11 residence that morning, right? 12 A. In front of what? 13 Q. In front of Rita Politte's house? 14 A. No. Now, you had an opportunity to observe Bernie later 15 16 that morning, right? 17 What are you talking about, later? A. Well, you had an opportunity to observe him when he 18 Q. sat down on the couch and said, there's my mom? 19 20 A. No. Oh, when he fell over? 21 Q. Right. 22 He didn't sit on it. He fell over it. A. 23 0. He fell over it? 24 A. Yes. 25 Q. Was he upset?

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- A. He was screaming in a high pitched voice.
- Q. Was he screaming in a high pitched voice?
- A. Yeah.
- $\ensuremath{\mathbb{Q}}$ . And did you get a chance to look at him at that point?
  - A. More or less, yes. I looked at him real quick.
  - Q. Did you see any blood on him anywhere?
  - A. No.
  - Q. There wasn't any blood, right?
  - A. No, not that I seen.
- Q. Wasn't any fresh scratches or cuts on him that you noticed?
  - A. No.
  - Q. His clothes weren't blood stained in any way?
  - A. No.
- Q. You had an opportunity to observe the other boy, right, Josh?
  - A. Yes.
- Q. And the same thing with him. You didn't notice any blood stains on him either, did you?
  - A. No.
  - Q. He wasn't cut up or anything like that, was he?
  - A. No.
    - MR. WILLIAMS: Nothing further.
    - MR. RUPP: Nothing further, Judge.

THE COURT: May this witness be excused?

MR. RUPP: Yes, Your Honor.

THE COURT: You may step down. You are excused.

(Witness excused, and a recess was taken.)

(The proceedings returned to open court, and the following was had:)
