## DIRECT EXAMINATION by Mr. Rupp:

- Q. Sir, can you state your name for the record, please.
  - A. Curtis Davis.
- Q. And, sir, can you tell the ladies and gentlemen of the jury what your occupation was on December the  $5^{\rm th}$ , of the year 1998?
- A. I was a detective at the Washington County

  Sheriff's Department.
- Q. And how long had you worked as a detective with the sheriff's department?
- A. At that time I was about a 13-year veteran of the law enforcement, and I was a detective for about three and a half years.
- Q. I'd like to call your attention to December 5<sup>th</sup>, of the year 1998, and ask you, did you receive a phone call that morning?
- A. Yes, I did.
  - Q. And can you tell the jury how that occurred?
- A. Yes. The Washington County Sheriff's Department dispatcher had contacted me by telephone at my residence.

  And they informed me that the sheriff was requesting my presence at a residence in Hopewell, Missouri, in reference to a possible homicide case.
  - Q. And is that in Washington County?

1 A. Yes, it is. 2 And when you received that call did you leave your home? A. Yes, I did. Did you go to that scene? Q. A. Q. A.

- Yes, I did.
- Do you know approximately what time you got there?
- Just, approximately a few minutes after seven in the a.m.
  - And when you arrived there, was anybody else there?
- The fire department personnel was there, Yes. Sheriff Ron Skiles, I believe it was Chief Deputy Walter Higgenbotham, and a Deputy John Lawrence.
- Q. And did you go to somebody or talk to somebody at that point?
- Yes. When I first arrived, I went ahead and made contact with Sheriff Ron Skiles. And he advised me that the department had received a call of the fire. And once they got there, they called the sheriff's department and told them that they had a body there, a female person, and that it appeared that she was deceased.
- Q. Okay. After the sheriff apprized you of the information, did he give you any instructions?
- A. Yes. First I went ahead and got my .35 millimeter camera, and I started taking pictures of the crime scene.

1 And after I took the first roll of film, Sheriff Skiles informed me that there was two juvenile subjects that had 2 3 been there overnight at the residence at the time of the incident. And he advised me that he had them placed outside 4 in the patrol car, away from the residence, awaiting upon my arrival so I could speak with them, interview them.

- Q. You said you started photographing the crime scene?
- A. Yes.

  - 0. You said you photographed the bed?
  - A. Yes.
  - Why did you photograph the bed?

1 A. Yes, it is. 2 Okay. And from your observations of the bedroom, the main crime scene, did there appear to be a struggle? 3 4 A. Yes, there did. 5 Did you photograph any other part of the house? 0. 6 A. No. 7 Why? Q. 8 Because after I ran out of film, the sheriff 9 approached me again, like I said, and he advised me at that time that there was two possible witnesses that was outside, 10 awaiting for my arrival to be interviewed. 11 12 And so you were pulled off the crime scene? 13 A. Yes. 14 And what did you do after you were pulled off the 15 crime scene? 16 A. I went out to the witnesses, and I spoke to the first one, which was, he was identified as Michael Bernard 17 Politte, which people call him Bernie Politte. 18 19 Q. Where was he? He was located out in the patrol vehicle of John 20 Lawrence's. 21 Q. Okay. And do you see that person present here 22 today in the courtroom? 23 A. Yes, I do. 24 And would you show the jury and the judge who that 25

individual is?

A. The young man there in the blue shirt and the brown pants in the middle.

MR. RUPP: Your Honor, I ask the record reflect this witness has identified the defendant.

THE COURT: The record will so reflect.

- Q.(By Mr. Rupp): Did you talk to the defendant?
- A. Yes, I did.
- Q. And why were you talking to him at this point?
- A. I was trying to find out if he might have seen or heard anything and what maybe occurred that night.
- Q. Is it fair to say that you thought he was a potential witness?
  - A. Yes.
- Q. Do you recall whether he gave you any information at that point?
  - A. Yes.
  - Q. And do you recall what information he gave you?
- A. Yes. I identified myself as a detective with the sheriff's department. I asked him if it was so that he was there all night in the house. And he said, yes, he was.

  And I told him to start with the events previous to the evening before and tell me what maybe he seen or heard or the occurrence that happened from the night before until that morning when we arrived.

Q. Do you recall what he told you?

A. Yes, I do. Michael Politte stated that he and a friend of his --

MR. WILLIAMS: Judge, may we approach?
THE COURT: Yes.

(The following proceedings were had at the bench out of the hearing of the jury:)

MR. WILLIAMS: Judge, for the record, I would like to renew my previous objections to the defendant's statements that were made either at the scene or later, subsequently at the sheriff's department, any knowledge of those statements by this particular officer based on my previous objections. I object to this on the fact that he was not advised of his Miranda warnings at the scene. this officer was questioning him. He was in a police car with the windows rolled up and the doors locked. And he was not free to leave. He was not advised of his Miranda warnings. We know that from the previous suppression hearing testimony, that was held in this court. And I would ask that he be not allowed to talk about anything that the defendant stated at this time or any subsequent times thereafter, because those would be tainted by fruits of the poisonous tree.

MR. RUPP: And I will stand on our previous suppression hearing. This witness has already testified he

was -- that he was interviewing him as a possible witness.

It wasn't until a subsequent time, after he interviewed him and interviewed another subject that he found inconsistencies, and he then became a suspect. And then he was taken to the sheriff's department and read his rights pursuant to the juvenile rights form by a juvenile officer and his father.

THE COURT: You're preserving your record. Your objection is noted for the record. The objection is overruled.

(The proceedings returned to open court, and the following was had:)

- Q.(By Mr. Rupp): Do you recall what he told you?
- A. Yes. Michael Politte had advised me that he and a friend was at his house the evening before, around 10:30 p.m., and that his mom went to bed about 12:30, and he and his friend went to bed about ten minutes later. And the next morning he woke up to the smell of smoke. He turned over and asked his friend if he had been smoking a cigarette. And his friend advised him, no, he had not. So they get up, they see a fire in his mom's bedroom. And so his friend goes running out of the house, yelling, call the fire department. And Michael Politte stated he couldn't get to the phone. So he ran out of the house and told his friend to turn on the hose. And he drug the water hose in

to try to put the fire out. And that his friend went up to the neighbor's house to call the fire department. And he stated that he couldn't get the fire out and realized that it was his mom on fire. So he ran up to meet his friend, and he was on his way back from the neighbor's. They met. They came back. They stood outside. And then the next thing they knew, the fire department had shown up.

- Q. Did he mention anything about his stereo?
- A. Yes, he did. He mentioned that when they went to bed that he had his stereo turned on throughout the night.
  - Q. Did he mention anything about a phone?
- A. No. He just -- whenever his friend told him to call the fire department, he said he couldn't get to the phone.
  - Q. But he said he couldn't get to the telephone?
  - A. Yes.
  - Q. Did you see a telephone in that residence?
  - A. Yes, I did.
- Q. Did you see Bernie Politte's room in that residence?
  - A. Yes, I did.
  - Q. Is there a phone nearby Bernie Politte's room?
- A. Yes, there was, right on the wall beside the bedroom.
  - Q. In other words, to exit the house did you have to

1 pass the phone? 2 A. Yes, you did. Q. And he indicated to you that he ran out and met 3 4 Josh somewhere? 5 Yes. He said he ran out, and he was going up to the neighbor's house to meet Josh. And Josh was on his way 6 7 back, and they met. Q. And he indicated to you at that point they never 8 9 went back into the house? A. At that point he did not admit going back into the 10 11 house, no. Q. And then the fire department showed up? 12 13 A. Right. 14 Q. After you interviewed the defendant, did you talk 15 to other witnesses? 16 A. Yes, I did. Q. And on the basis of that, did you make some 17 18 conclusions? 19 A. Yes, I did. 20 Q. And what was that? 21 MR. WILLIAMS: Objection, Your Honor, unless we know what witnesses he talked to. 22 23 THE COURT: Sustained. 24 Q.(By Mr. Rupp): After you interviewed other witnesses 25 what did you do?

Okay. I interviewed other witnesses. I came back and advised Sheriff Skiles of what I was told. And I had inconsistencies of statements from these witnesses. decided at that time, Skiles and I, to go ahead and take the two boys that was there overnight into the sheriff's department for further investigation.

- Q. At that point had your focus on these boys shifted from witnesses to something else?
  - Yes. A.
  - And what was that?
- At that point they became from witnesses to suspects.
- Q. And after you advised Skiles of that, did he give you a directive?
- A. Yes, he did. He told me to transport Michael Politte in to the sheriff's department and have John Lawrence transport the other subject in to the sheriff's department.
- Q. Okay. After you got that instruction what did you do?
- Well, Michael Politte, John Lawrence had taken him up to use the restroom at a different residence. And when he came back I placed him in my patrol car, and I started to transport him in to the sheriff's department.
  - Q. And did you tell him anything?

A. No, I did not.

Did he react to this?

A. He asked me why I had to take him in Yes, he did. to the sheriff's department. I told him we were conducting an investigation, that this was a serious crime. we needed to cover all the details and try to find out who committed this crime.

What did he say to you?

He was kind of agitated and said, I don't know why you guys taking me to the sheriff's department. That I told you everything I knew. So, I said, well, I said, don't you want me to catch who done this to your mom. And he said, yes, I do. On the way to the sheriff's department, we was approximately a mile away from the house, Michael Politte asked me a question. Asked me if he could ask me a question. I said, go ahead. And he said, can I ask you who's going to get my mom's truck? And I said, well, that would depend on whose name is on the title.

And what was his reaction to that?

So, then we went ahead and drove in to the sheriff's department after that. And he just sat there while we drove in there. And I placed him in a seat at the sheriff's department in the office and told him we had to wait for the juvenile officer to get there, his dad, and the fire marshal.

- Q. And what was his reaction when you told him we'd have to wait for a few minutes?
- A. Okay. We waited for approximately 15, 20 minutes before everybody arrived. And after that amount of time he said, "Hey, man, when the heck are you going to take me home? I'm tired, and I want to go home and go back to bed."
- Q. During this period of time, other than the angry outburst, when you told him you were taking him to the sheriff's department, how was he acting?
- A. He was just acting normal as far as sitting there. He didn't act too concerned of what had just taken place in the residence.
  - Q. Show any visible signs of remorse?
  - A. No, he did not.
- Q. Eventually, did the juvenile officer and his father come?
  - A. Yes, he did.
  - Q. And what happened then?
- A. After they all got there, we took him in a room, and the juvenile officer read him the Miranda rights under the Miranda warning, that he had the right to an attorney and so forth and so on. His dad --
- Q. Hang on just a second. I'm going to show you what's been previously marked as number 66. Is that the form that you just referred to?

A. Yes, it is.

Q. And it has several signatures on it?

A. Yes, it does.

Q. Including the defendant's?

A. Yes.

Q. The defendant's father?

A. Yes.

Q. And other officers'?

A. Yes.

Q. Okay. What happened then?

A. Okay. We started talking to him once again. We told him to go ahead and tell us once more what happened from the night before until that day. He said that he came home from school, he found a marijuana cigarette. So he took it down to the Hopewell store, met a friend, and they smoked the marijuana cigarette. Then they played a few games of pool. Another person came down that was a friend of his and had another marijuana cigarette. So he smoked that one. And then he went ahead and played some more pool. And then when the other subject that was staying all night with him had -- got done doing some work for the store manager, they went up to his house, and this was about 10:30 p.m.

Q. Went to whose house?

A. To Michael Politte's house.

Q. Did he indicate how they got there?

A. A friend took them in a car.

Q. Did he indicate what happened when they arrived?

A. Yes. They said they arrived about 10:30 p.m. They played about five or six of Chess, and then they played some Play Station. Michael Politte stated that his friend got bored. And so he asked, Michael asked his friend if he wanted to go start a fire. So Michael stated that he took a jug of gasoline and some trash and carried it down to the railroad tracks and set a railroad tie on fire.

Q. What did he say one more time? I didn't hear you. Speak up a little bit.

A. Okay. He said he took --

MR. WILLIAMS: Objection, Your Honor. It's been asked and answered.

THE COURT: Overruled.

Q.(By Mr. Rupp): Speak up.

A. Okay. He said he took a container of gasoline and some trash, and he and his friend went down to the railroad tracks and poured the gas on the railroad tie and started a fire. (USing Trask)

- Q. So he indicated he poured a liquid onto the tracks?
- A. Yes, onto the railroad tie.
- Q. Did he indicate what kind of liquid?
- A. I believe he said it was gasoline.

Did he say what kind of gasoline? 1 2 No, he did not. And then he put trash on top of that? 3 He said he carried trash down there. He didn't say 4 he put it on top, no. Did the find the frash uning 5 And he indicated that he had set it on fire? 6 7 A. Yes. What did he indicate happened after he had set it on fire? 10 He stated that his friend said he heard a panther And then both of them heard a scream, like a 11 panther. And they took off, back up to the house. Michael 12 Politte said once they arrived at the house, it was about --13 14 MR. WILLIAMS: Judge, I would just simply object to the narrative form. 15 16 THE COURT: Sustained. Q. (Mr. Rupp): After he indicated they heard the panther 17 scream, did he tell you what they did? 18 19 He said they got scared and ran back up to the house. 20 Did he indicate approximately what time he said 21 22 they arrived back at the house? He stated approximately five minutes after twelve. 23 And after they arrived back at the house, did he

indicate what happened next?

- Yes. He said about 10 minutes after they arrived back at the house that his mom came home.
- Q. And did he indicate what, if anything, happened when his mom came home?
- Yes, he did. He said that she brought him a sandwich from Subway, and that he shared that sandwich with his friend, and that she went to bed about 10, 15 minutes, and told them to turn off the lights whenever they went to bed.
- Okay. Now, when you say she and his mom, do you know who he was referring to?
  - A. Yes, Rita Politte.
  - 0. And that's the victim in this case?
  - Yes, it is. A.
- Now, after his mother went to bed, did he indicate what they did for that 10 or 15 minutes?
- They more or less ate the sandwich, and then about 10 or 15 minutes later him and his friend went to bed.
  - Q. Did he indicate where he went to bed?
- In the bedroom there before you -- to the right of A. the door, as you're -- it would be to the left of the door if you walk into the house, and if you're walking towards the front door it would be to the right.
- Q. I'm going to show you what's been marked as State's Exhibit No. 17 for identification, and ask you, is that the

room that he was referring to? 1 2 Yes, it was. 3 And in that exhibit it has a photograph of a door? 4 A. Yes. 5 Correct, a bed? 6 A. Yes. 7 And then about three, four feet away a pillow? 8 A. Yes. 9 A blanket? 10 A. Yes. 11 0. A wall and a closet? 12 A. Yes. 13 With a television in the corner? Q. 14 A. Yes. What did he say when they went in and went to bed? 15 He said that the next morning he had been awakened 16 17 by smoke. 18 Did he indicate what the sleeping arrangements 19 were? He was in the bed, and his friend was in the floor. 20 A. Then what did he say had happened? 21 Q. 22 Said when he woke up, when the smoke woke him up, he turned, looked down to his friend, and asked his friend 23 24 if he was smoking a cigarette. Q. Did he indicate the room was smokey?

- A. Yes, he did.
- Q. And when he found the room was smokey, he asked his friend, correct?
  - A. Right.
  - Q. Then what happened when he asked his friend?
- A. Said he and his friend got up, they went to the door. His friend opened the door. The house was real smokey. So he said that they crawled out of the house.
- Q. Wait a minute. He said they crawled out of the house?
  - A. Yes.
- Q. I thought you testified previously in his first interview they said they ran out of the house?
  - A. Yes, I did.
  - Q. I'm sorry. Okay, you said crawl?
  - A. Yes.
- Q. All right. He said they crawled out of the house. Then what?
- A. And they went over to his mom's bedroom window and knocked on it to try to wake her up.
  - Q. So he didn't indicate they went into the bedroom?
  - A. No.
- Q. Then what did he say after they both went to the window?
  - A. Michael Politte said that he told his friend to

turn on the water hose, and that he, Michael, grabbed the water hose and stretched it through the house and attempted to put the fire out.

- Q. Did he say what happened then?
- A. Yes. He said his friend ran up to the house, to the neighbor's house, to call the fire department, get some help. And as he was trying to put the fire out, he realized that it was his mom on fire.
  - Q. Okay.
- A. And he couldn't put it out, so he freaked out, realizing it was his mom on fire, and he ran to get his friend.
  - Q. Did he say where he ran?
  - A. Up to the neighbor's home.
  - Q. Did he say what neighbor's home he ran to?
  - A. No.
- Q. What did he say happened once he ran up to the neighbor's home?
- A. He said by the time that he got to the neighbor's house that Josh was starting to come back, that's his friend, starting to come back down. So they came back to the house, and they met his uncle, Chuck Skiles.
- Q. What happened at the particular point he made that statement? Did somebody interrupt? What Is truly to we have
  - A. When he went to meet his friend, he told his friend

that that was his mom on fire.

- Okay. I'm talking about at the interview. happened next after he stated that?
- Well, then what he said, he met his uncle, Chuck Skiles, and told Chuck Skiles that his mom was on fire.
  - Q. Then what happened?
- Sheriff Ronnie Skiles asked him, asked Mike A. Politte, if he was sure he didn't tell his uncle, Chuck Skiles that his mom was dead and she was on fire.
  - What happened when the sheriff asked that? Q.
- Well, Michael Politte said that, "I might have said A. that." And then he jumps up in a rage and throws his hands in front of him, and he says, "Come on, Dad. Let's get out of here."
  - Q. Then what happened?
- And he says, "They're trying to pin something on me that I didn't do." I told him, I said, you can't leave yet. We're not interviewing you. And Michael Politte said, "Dad, this is a bunch of shit. They're trying to pin something on me that I didn't do."
- And up to that point was that the first show of Q. emotion?

  - Then what happened? Q.
  - Then I went on to ask him some more questions.

asked Michael Politte if he was sure that he didn't stay in the house when his friend ran out of the house. And he said, yes, he was sure. Or, no, let me back up. I'm sorry. After they met his uncle, Chuck Skiles, he said that he and Chuck Skiles ran in, back into the house.

- Q. Now, wait a minute. Didn't you testify earlier that he never went back into the house?
  - A. Yes.
- Q. Are you sure this time he said that they both went into the house?
  - A. Yes.
  - Q. That was his statement?
  - A. That he and Chuck Skiles went back into the house.
  - Q. What did he say then?
- A. I asked him if Josh went back into the house with him. He said, no. I asked him if he was sure. He said, yes. And I asked him the question, didn't Josh go back in the house with you and open some windows. And he said, "Oh, that's right. I forgot. He did go back in the house."
- Q. And that's something that you heard earlier; is that correct?
  - A. Yes.
  - Q. And then what did he say?
- A. So then he said that he pointed and told Chuck where his mom was, and that he and Josh opened some windows,

and then they went back out of the house and waited for the fire department.

Q. Did he tell you anything else?

- A. I asked him if he was sure, if he ran out of the house at the same time his friend did when they first found out the house was on fire. And he said, yes. And I told him I was informed that he stayed in and called out to his mom. And he said, no, that was not true. And I asked him if -- then I asked him if he was sure that he ran over to the mom's window with his friend. And he said, yes. And I also told him again that I was told that he stayed in the house while his friend went to his mom's window, and then he came out and went to get the water hose. And he said that that was not true, also.
  - Q. Did he tell you anything else?
- A. He said that they stayed outside. Michael Politte said that they remained outside after they went out the last time after opening windows. And his uncle went in and tried to put out the fire.
- Q. So he told you that they opened the windows before the uncle went to put out the fire, is what he told you, correct?
- A. Once they met the uncle outside, he said that's when they all went in together, and they opened windows.

  They came back outside and then stayed out while the uncle

had to run up and get some pans of water and take the --

- Q. But he clearly indicated that they had opened the windows prior to the fire department's arrival?
  - A. Yes.
  - Q. Does that pretty conclude that interview?
  - A. Yes.
  - Q. Did you meet up with the defendant at another time?
  - A. Yes, I did.
  - Q. Would that have been around December the  $7^{th}$ ?
  - A. Yes, it was.
  - Q. What do you recall about that second meeting?
- A. Okay. The deputy juvenile officer had received a 72-hour pickup from the judge, Troy Hyde. I contacted Michael Politte's father. He brought Michael Politte in. And we was going to interview him one more time. And when the juvenile officer was reading his Miranda rights, Michael Politte started banging his fingers on the table (demonstrating) --

MR. WILLIAMS: Your Honor, I would object at this point and based on the previous objections I made at side bar.

THE COURT: Noted for the record. The objection's overruled.

Q.(By Mr. Rupp): What was his reaction then when she read the Miranda rights?

MR. WILLIAMS: Judge, I should be more specific.

I'm sorry. The objections were based on statements made by
Bernie Politte. That would be my objections to this officer
testifying on this additional interview about those
statements.

THE COURT: Objection's overruled.

Q.(By Mr. Rupp): What happened?

- A. Okay. The juvenile officer was reading Michael Politte his Miranda rights, advising he had the right to an attorney. Michael Politte started banging his fingers on the desk (demonstrating) and said, "Yes, I want a fucking attorney." And so we stopped all interviews at that time.
- Q. And by that, you mean you didn't ask him any questions?
  - A. Yes.
  - Q. Did anybody in your presence ask him any questions?
  - A. No.
  - Q. Did he make any additional statements?
- A. Yes, he did. He said that we was all stupid. That we didn't know that gas don't burn down, that chemicals burn down.
  - Q. Did he say anything else?
  - A. Not to my memory.
  - Q. Anything about expertise in fires?
  - A. Oh, yes. That he knows how to start fires and make

fires, and that we didn't know what we was talking about. 1 Q. Now, you've previously identified Mr. Politte, 2 3 correct? 4 A. Yes, I did. Is that the person that made those statements to 5 6 you? 7 A. Yes, it is. MR. RUPP: I have no further questions, Judge. 8 CROSS-EXAMINATION by Mr. Williams: 9 Q. Detective Davis, you were a detective at the time 10 of this incident, right? 11 12 A. Yes. 13 Q. And at the time of this incident you -- well, let me just back up. A detective is an investigator for the 14 15 sheriff's department? 16 A. Yes, he is. That's for the sheriff's department? 17 18 A. Yes. 19 And would it be fair to say your responsibilities 20 are to investigate crime? 21 A. Yes. Q. By sometimes collecting evidence? 22 A. Sometimes, yes. 24 Q. Preserving evidence? 25 A. Yes.
